HB0640 / SB0479	Limited government - Redefines money and paves the way for a Central Bank Digital Currency (CBDC), which will be weaponized against us. Was amended to replace all the bad text with a simple statement that CBDCs are not bank accounts in Tennessee.	<b>WIN</b> - Passed by the House and Senate. Great example of how a bad bill can be transformed into a good bill. Something to keep in mind for future sessions

HB1183 / SB0503	Education Integrity - The bill summary refers to school credit cards, but this is actually Governor Lee's school choice bill. HB1202 / SB1325	<b>Child protection</b> - Allows concealed carry for specially trained school staff.	WIN - Passed by the House and Senate.
HB1626 / SB1590	Child protection - As introduced, enacts the "Fundamental Right to Reproductive Health Care Act."	<b>WIN</b> - Failed in the House Population Health Subcommittee.
HB1663 / SB1834	<b>Child protection</b> - Authorizes the death penalty as a punishment for the rape of a child.	WIN - Passed by the House and Senate.
HB1667 / SB1695	<b>Second Amendment</b> - Authorizes local governments to regulate storage of firearms in your vehicle while unoccupied.	<b>WIN</b> - Failed in the Senate Judiciary Committee.
HB1712 / SB1652	<b>Second Amendment</b> - Allows a court to decide, without due process, if you are a danger by having firearms.	<b>WIN</b> - Failed in the House Civil Justice Subcommittee for lack of a second.
HB1713 / SB1654	Second Amendment - Criminalizes knowingly selling or otherwise transferring a firearm to someone not allowed to have guns.	<b>WIN</b> - Failed in the Senate Judiciary Committee.



HB1726 / SB2359	<b>Medical Freedom</b> - Ends the immunization requirement to adopt or foster a child.	<b>WIN</b> - Passed by the House and Senate. Signed by the Governor.
HB1727 / SB1587	<b>Child Protection</b> - Criminalizes leaving children with a known sex offender.	WIN - Passed by the House and Senate.
HB1872 / SB2770	Illegal Immigration - Increase the penalty for illegals convicted of violent crimes.	WIN - Passed by the House and Senate.
HB1883 / SB1641	Medical freedom - Allows daily hospital visits to patients by those making their healthcare decisions, even during a state of emergency.	WIN - Passed by the House and Senate.
HB1894 / SB1903	<b>Limited Government</b> - Defines food with a vaccine or vaccine material as a drug.	WIN - Passed by the House and Senate.
HB1895 / SB1971	<b>Child protection</b> - Makes abortion trafficking of a minor a criminal offense.	WIN - Passed by the House and Senate.

HB2105 / SB1808	<b>Illegal Immigration</b> - Allows illegals to obtain driver's licenses.	<b>WIN</b> - Failed in the Senate Transportation Committee.
HB2117 / SB2743	Limited Government - Requires political subdivisions to attest that they have not sought or received grants for UN initiatives like Agenda 2030, and any that violate the U.S. constitution or the state constitution.	WIN - Passed by the House and Senate.

HB2196 / SB2192	<b>Second Amendment</b> - Limits magazine size.	<b>WIN</b> - Failed in the Senate Judiciary Committee for lack of a second.	
HB2198 / SB2263	<b>Child Protection</b> - Increases the penalty for threatening violence at schools.	WIN - Passed by the House and Senate.	
HB2199 / SB1785	<b>Second Amendment</b> - Expands penalties for firearm endangerment.	<b>WIN</b> - Failed in the Senate Judiciary Committee.

HB1625 / SB1673	<b>Limited Government</b> - Requires mental health professionals to report people with suspected mental illness.	LOSS - Passed by the House and Senate.
HB1632 / SB1858	<b>Child protection</b> - Allows parents to sue to remove pornography from our schools.	LOSS - Taken off notice in the House. The bill passed in the Senate.
HB1661 / SB2173	<b>Child Protection</b> - Residents of a district can petition to prohibit obscene materials in their libraries.	LOSS - The Senate bill has been deferred to summer study, so no vote will be held this year.
HB1695 / SB2020	<b>Limited Government</b> - Allows the state to hide autopsies to avoid public scrutiny.	LOSS - Passed by the House and Senate.
HB1841 / SB2859	<b>Limited Government</b> - Prohibits certain foreign entities from bidding on contracts for TN or its political subdivisions.	<b>LOSS</b> - The bill failed in the House Public Service Subcommittee.
HB1904 / SB2180	<b>Second Amendment</b> - Allows a concealed carry permit holder to carry everywhere.	LOSS - The bill failed in the Senate Judiciary Committee.
HB1945 / SB1760	Limited Government - Requires the state to publish the vaccines approved for livestock and poultry and identify those genetically engineered.	LOSS - The House bill was deferred to summer study, so no vote will be held this year. The Senate bill was withdrawn.
HB1948 / SB2350	Education Integrity - Establishes prohibitions and requirements for public institutions of higher education regarding diversity, equity, and inclusion.	LOSS - The bill failed in the House Higher Education Subcommittee.
HB1949 / SB2781	<b>Child Protection</b> - Expands the penalty for observing people when they expect privacy.	LOSS - The Senate bill was deferred to summer study, so no vote will be held this year.
HB1956 / SB1765	Medical Freedom - Allows the import of medical drugs from Canada.	LOSS - The bill failed in the Senate Commerce and Labor Committee for lack of a second.
HB1973 / SB1791	<b>Medical Freedom</b> - Requires screening for all infants for genetic, metabolic, and other inheritable conditions.	LOSS - Passed by the House and Senate.
HB2032 / SB2912	<b>Second Amendment</b> - Removes penalties for carrying a firearm in a "gun-free zone" for those with enhanced gun permits.	LOSS - The House sponsor took the bill off notice for this session, but says he will bring it back next year.



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HB2034 / SB2568	Illegal Immigration - Makes temporary non-citizen drivers' licenses, photo identification, and temporary permits easily distinguishable from regular citizen driver licenses.	LOSS - The Senate bill was deferred to summer study, so no vote will be held this year.
HB2094 / SB1861	<b>Limited Government</b> - Prohibits the governor from dividing counties into separate declarations of emergency.	LOSS - The Senate bill died in general subcommittee. The House bill was taken off notice.
HB2457 / SB2107	<b>Child Protection</b> - Requires removal of porn from school libraries.	LOSS - The Senate bill was deferred to summer study, so no vote will be held this year.
HB2618 / SB2561	<b>Limited Government -</b> Requires non-profits to provide their list of donors	LOSS - Passed by the House and Senate.
HB2795 / SB2775	<b>Limited Government</b> - Establishes five paths for the citizens of Tennessee to nullify unconstitutional federal overreach, including a petition process.	LOSS - The Senate bill was deferred to summer study, so no vote will be held this year.
HB2800 / SB2838	<b>Election Integrity</b> - Requires proof of eligibility for elected office prior to being granted ballot access.	LOSS - Both Senate and House bills were withdrawn due to political pressure from those who misunderstood the bill.

HB2912 / SB2804	Limited Government - This is a caption bill. The actual bill prevents the FBI from using local resources against TN citizens.	LOSS - Failed in the Senate Judiciary Committee.

HB2452 / SB2641	Medical Freedom - Changes childhood vaccination guidelines to the local commissioner of health when advised by the parent or legal guardian's trusted healthcare provider.	<b>DEAD</b> - The Senate Health & Welfare Committee did not take up the bill. The House bill passed.

HB2933 / SB2937	Medical Freedom - Requires medical examiners to document drugs used over the past 10 years in suspicious circumstances.	<b>DEAD</b> - The House bill was taken off notice in the Health Subcommittee. The Senate bill died in a general subcommittee.
